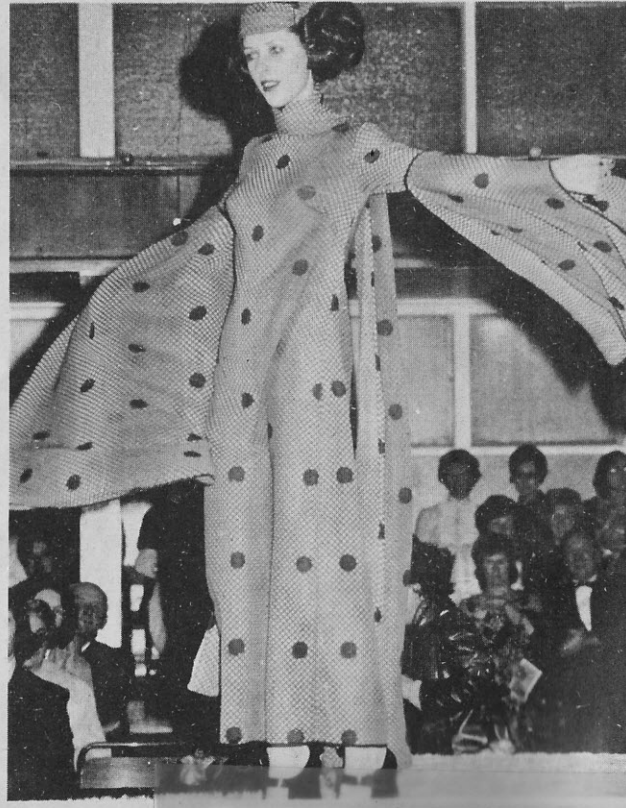




VINKA LUCAS FASHIONS

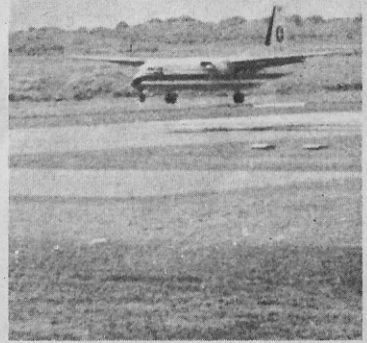

AIR CONTROL

Robert Ellis, BELOW LEFT, is one of three Air Traffic Controllers based in New Plymouth. Operating the nerve centre of the air is no easy job, as "Photo News" discovered. At a small airport like ours there are between 50 and 100 movements on a weekday and, at the weekend, between 250 and 300 movements per day. Understandably perhaps, all air traffic controllers have had air-crew experience, or hold pilots' licenses. Using reports from aircraft on altitude, speed and estimates of position, they keep all aircraft pinpointed and advise other craft of the positions of planes in their vicinity. All planes in the area of New Plymouth's control (25 miles long by 7 miles wide) must obey any instruction issued by a controller.

Four years ago, my family and I took up residence in New Plymouth. We came initially because of the opportunity to expand experience in the career I then pursued, that of journalism, and also because we liked the thought of living in this wonderful city.

We have so much to offer; much more than some of the recognised tourist centres. But we must make sure that we make the best of our attractions and cater, even pander, to our visitors.

The best salesman for tourists is the satisfied tourist, and the services, courtesies and local attitudes that he meets go a long way in determining whether, or not he is satisfied. Those who travel remember a place, not only for its scenic attractions and accommodation, but more especially for the way in which they were welcomed and cared for. In the same way, they no doubt remember the places at which they were poorly treated. Thus we must look to our laurels and go out of our way to make sure we gain the maximum benefits from satisfied tourists and holidaymakers.

Everyone has a part to play in this. It is also important that everyone spreads the word about New Plymouth and Taranaki wherever they go. If you are planning a tour, visit or holiday to some other centre, think about publicising your home area.

We at the Public Relations Office have brochures and other eye-catching material on hand and will

gladly distribute it to anyone interested enough to call in or contact us. A pamphlet left in a motel or hotel room, camping ground, bus, restaurant, etc., might be picked up by someone else and may result in another visitor to this area. And that person could leave as a satisfied salesman for New Plymouth and Taranaki. We, all of us, are salesmen (or women). It is said that familiarity breeds contempt, but who can base contempt of the wonderful parks, reserves and numerous other attractions we have on our doorstep?

Walk about with eyes open, enjoy our assets and make every attempt to tell others about them. Tourism in New Zealand is about to boom and we must make every effort to gain our share of what is becoming a lucrative market.

The best possible form of advertising is by word of mouth. Let's all start, and keep talking, boasting if you like, about our friendly scenic city and province. We have, you know, a lot to talk about.

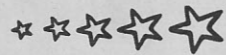

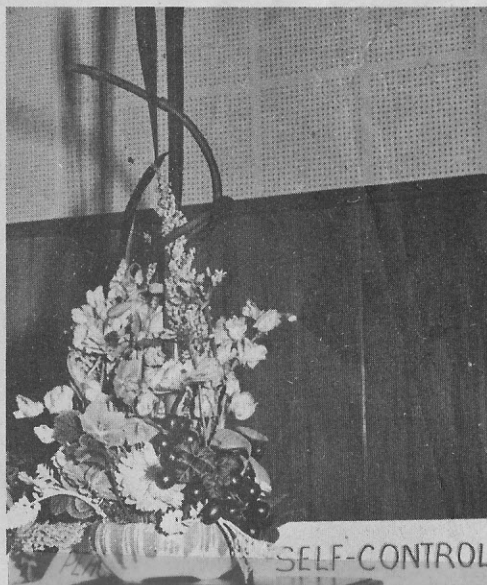


ECUMENICAL DAY

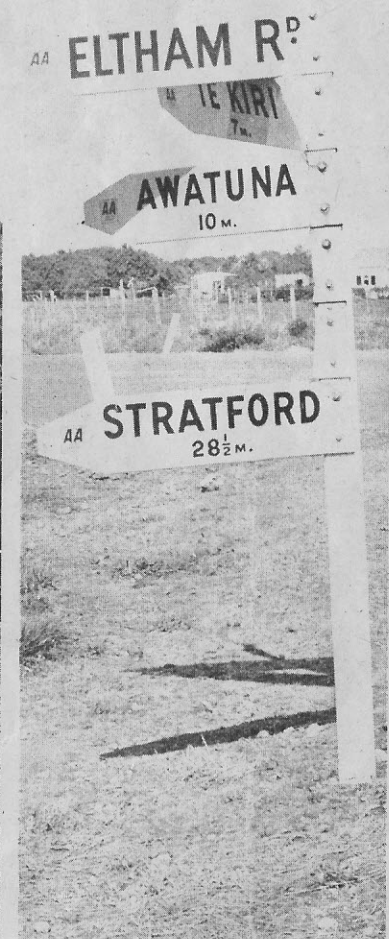
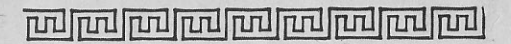
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VANDALISM

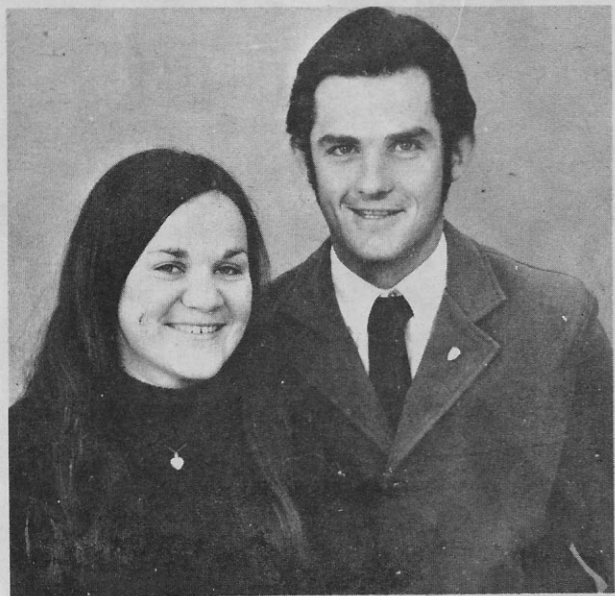

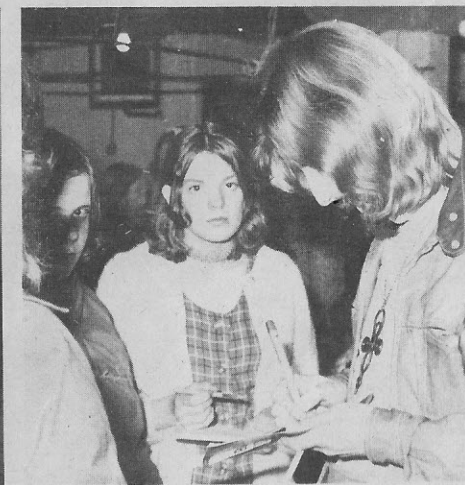

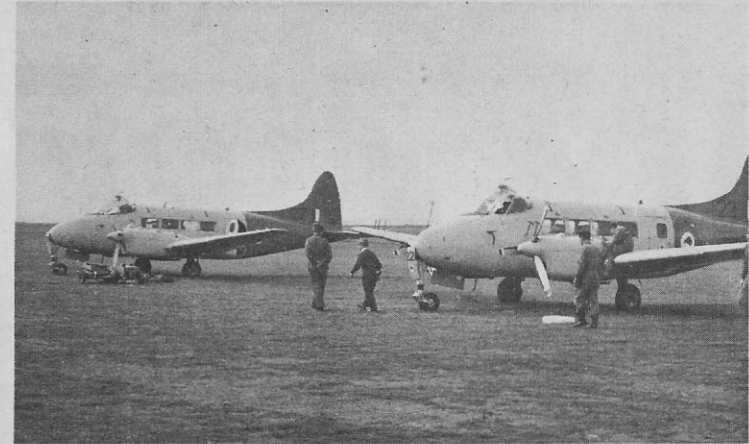
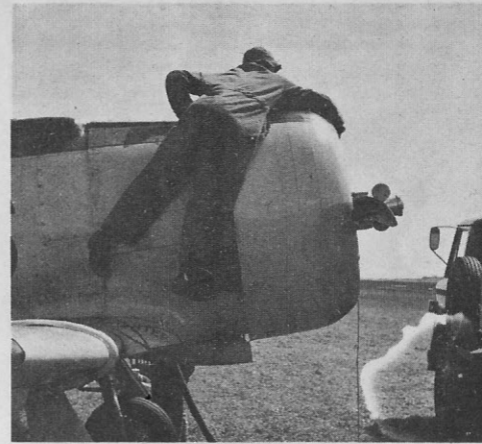

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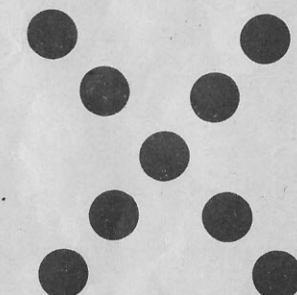

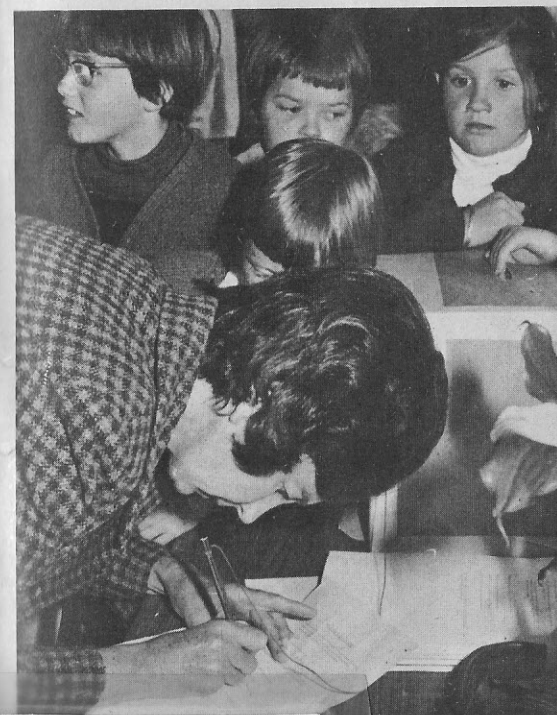


JAPAN WEEK

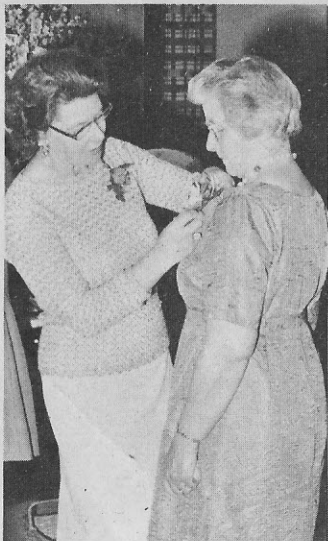

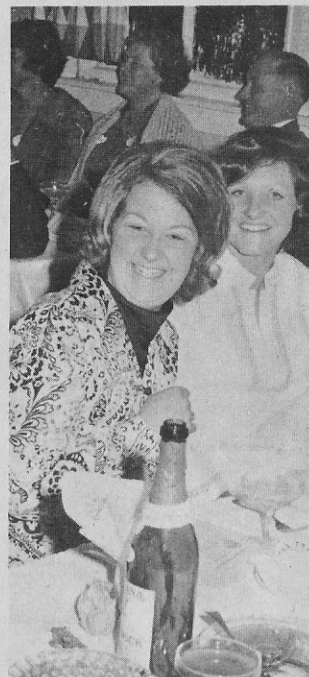
