ILLSTON

Alfred Illston enlisted in the army like his father and grandfather before him. He bought his way out less than four years later when he was only 21, becoming a Customs Officer on Mauritius in the Indian Ocean. He left for New Zealand after hearing of the gold strikes and arrived in Wanganui in 1863.

Because of the demand for men, especially trained soldiers, at the time of the land confiscations in Taranaki, he joined (quote, including all errors of grammar),

"the Alexander Troop. Captain Cameron was one of the advance escort for B.G. Waddy when he recconitred. Weraroa Pa opened the fire upon us though we where at a very safe distance, afterwards joined the Commissariet Corp under Major Turner drove a bullock tearright through with G. Cameron was present at the Nukumaru fight where the Maoris surprised the camp and at Kakaramea and several other skirmishes was with R. Hawes Rifles at Wairoa helped build the Wairoa Redoubt, have been in various Volunteer Corps since hoping you will take this into your favourable consideration.

I have the honour to remain Yours obediently Alfred Thomas Illston.''

The above is a quote from a letter written in December 1913 applying for the New Zealand War Medal as no more claims were going to be accepted after the 14 January 1914 and "... my sons are worrying me to apply..."

Alfred bought land off his fellow militia men in 1869 and began farming. In 1874 he left Wairoa for a 425 acre property at Wakamaru although as late as 1882 he still owned land at Waverley valued at twenty pounds (\$40).

The family has spread as far as Auckland and Te Awamutu and Pirongia and Silverhope (between Marton and Hunterville), but one of the family has come back to live in Waverley—David and Sonia Johnson and their family, who live little more than a stone's throw from the site of the redoubt which his great grandfather helped to build. One of the reasons Davesettled in Waverley, including the purchase of land, was the knowledge that his ancestor first settled here. Unfortunately he has been unable to locate the original property owned by the Illstons.

IACKSON

Although I have started the family tree with Edward Rayney Jackson, Freeman's son, I feel that a special mention needs to be made of Freeman. Freeman Jackson is best remembered in conjunction with his firm Freeman Jackson & Co., the stock, station and auctioneering firm, but Freeman was more than that. He was a true pioneer in the greatest sense of the word. He arrived at Lyttleton with his widowed mother and family in 1851, going south in 1854 and in 1862 after his marriage to Annie Shea-Lawlor of Riverton in 1859, he moved to Manapouri, building their homestead on Balloon Loop on the Waiau River.

Annie herself must have been rather a remarkable woman, as she bore up to the solitary life with great cheerfulness according to surveyor J. Baker.

By this time Freeman was a Provincial Councillor and was often away for many days at meetings in Invercargill, a ride of some hundred miles. The homestead was visited by C.D. Barraud in 1882 and painted. This lovely homestead painting now hangs in the home of Monty Jackson, Waverley, his great grandson.

Freeman Burn and Jackson Peaks in the district are named after him. Freeman later moved to Wanganui and started up his successful business, and in 1892 he was elected mayor of Wanganui, unopposed. He was described as a man of "considerable charm and personal magnetism", and certainly did a lot to help farmers in the Waverley area.

His son, Edward Rayney, attended Collegiate then worked in his father's office before moving to Waverley and taking up a property of 814 acres. He also leased "Rosemount" off the Peat estate. Edward was an amateur rider and rode "Rosemount" to victory in the Rangitikei Hunt Cup 1923. He was also a director of his father's firm.



JOHNSTON

Captain George Johnston, VD, was an experienced, distinguished soldier receiving both the Queen's Special Gold and Silver Medal for long and distinguished service as an officer, and the New Zealand War Medal, as well as the Volunteer Long Service Medal.

After seeing active service in Napier, Taupo and with the famous Kai Iwi Troop, George joined the Aramoho Light Horse in which he served as a Sergeant. Later he was first Lieuttenant in the Wairoa Light Horse and when that became the Wairoa Mounted Rifles was Captain from 1888-1892.

In 1870 he married Maria Thurston. George served on several committees and was chairman of directors and one of the founders of the Waverley Dairy Co. He also formed the Oturi Co-Operative Cheese Co. Two of his sons ran the woolscouring plant.

Johnston Road in Waverley is named after this family.



LUPTON

Isaac Lupton was born in Stainley, near Harrogate in Yorkshire and moved to Australia before coming to New Zealand. He worked in Otago and Blenheim before moving to Waverley. He joined the Wairoa Volunteer Rifles in 1868 and received the New Zealand Medal for his services.

Lupton bought one or more soldiers' sections, one of them being at the end of Hooper's Lane where his first home was built. Lupton's name also appears as being one of the early settlers to buy land in the first land sales in 1873. In the time before leaving the Wairoa Volunteer Rifles and 1876, Isaac in partnership with John Morton, bought 313 acres of the railway reserve as well as other properties. He worked Mitchell's property up towards the Domain, and the land of the estate of William Hussey who had been killed in 1865. He also leased the the racecourse in 1878.

Isaac also built a new home at the end of Lupton Street. This was his wife's first home before he built the homestead of "Stainley Park" where Leon and Margot Lupton now live.

Isaac was 42 when he married Margaret Wilkie of Waitotara. I found the records suggest that Isaac only had ten children, but old birth registers indicate that there were, in fact, three more.

Isaac's "Stainley Park" became a venue for racing, polo and cricket as well as hunting. Indeed it is for the association with horses that the Lupton family is renowned, with the fourth generation involved with racing, hunting and showing, and the fifth, while still very young, would appear to have the same tendencies! Isaac was well-known throughout the colony for his magnificent Clydesdales.

Isaac was an astute business man, and his interests extended to grain cropping, a licensed slaughter house, a retail butchery and a dairy company. Isaac was also the first chairman of the Waverley Co-Operative Dairy Co.

Lupton Street in Waverley is named after the family. The affairs of the Lupton family are detailed in "The Legacy of Tui".





McDONALD Duncan

Duncan McDonald was born in Appin, Scotland and his wife Mary was born in Argyllshire, Scotland. They came to New Zealand in 1857 on the ship "Barque Gleaner" landing in Wellington. The McDonalds lived in Hawkes Bay before moving to Waverley and settling on their farm which they called "Burnside".

This property on Beach Road is now owned by Mervyn Jefferies.

Duncan and Mary had a family of seven children, but as it is only the descendants of Finley and Duncan who remained in the area, it is only Finlay (a) and Duncan (b) with which we will deal.

McDONALD

Watson McDonald was one of the first pioneers in the district, breaking in land at Kohi in the first land sales in 1873. As the story goes they were chased out during hostilities with the Maoris.

After that he had a farm on Parahaki Road, the first on the left around the corner. That land was sold and the McDonalds moved into town to a house behind the Clarendon.

MACEARI ANE

By the turn of the century, William Macfarlane's business had already been going for 25 vears.

There is no doubt that it was the most successful in the area being responsible for the majority of building done about the town. The firm was so versatile that they were able to draw up plans for the settlers who didn't already have plans drawn up by an architect.

Macfarlane himself, was an astute business man and a skilled tradesman. Before he came to New Zealand in the 70's he had already spent many years in Scotland working on important projects there. One of his employers was the Marquis of Bute, the owner of the alleged "second biggest private residence in Britain"! The establishment is reputed to have cost no less than three million pounds! A mind-boggling amount even today.

Macfarlane was an elder in the Presbyterian Church and a member of the Waverley Debating Club. as well as being connected with the church in Victoria Avenue and the Masonic Lodge.

It must have been while on one of these commuting trips that the incident happened which I found in a 1870's Patea Mail. Apparently Macfarlane was riding home from Wanganui when his horse's front leg snapped for no apparent reason. Luckily Mr Hurley, the Waitotara baker. happened by in his trap and offered him a ride. Unfortunately this was not Macfarlane's day. Before he had gone very far with his Good Samaritan the horse took fright and landed both the men "in a furze bush"

Macfarlane took a very active part in community life and was part of the backbone of Waverley's early days. Many of his buildings still stand in and around Waverley.

There were two clans of McLeans — originally McLeans of Castle Duart and McLeans of Loch Bouich. John Oban claimed that he was the rightful head of both clans owing to intermarriage. This would take some time proving today, but if it was correct then the head of the McLeans would be his grandson Neil McLean, now deceased, but his son lan still lives in Wanganui.

John Oban McLean was born in Scotland in 1830 and married in Glasgow to Agnes Drummond. Almost immediately they emigrated to New Zealand and their first son was born in Lamb Hill which was a farm at Bonny Glen, a district about six miles on the Wanganui side of Marton. John Oban was listed as a Waverley settler in the magazine issued by the Waverley Presbyterian Church for its Diamond Jubilee.

The old McLean two storied home of Annanni was on the first road to the right after crossing the Kohi Gorge — a short road, no exit. The house was about half a mile back from the end of the road. John and his wife both lived at Kohi and are buried in Waverley. John owned several farms other than Annanni, being a very ambitious man in that his wish was to own "all the land he could see", but he bought too heavily, and very early in the slump collapsed. The result was that the McLeans lost everything.

There is rather an interesting story as to how the McLeans came to be included in this book. I had come across three of the McLean women having married into other families, and then when I read Graham Mourie's book he mentioned his grandfather who played for Waverley. I wrote to him, but he being overseas, his mother Juan replied. Her mother was a Cicilie Merriman, daughter of the jeweller in Waverley for many years. The McLeans married into many other established families in the area as you will see.



MATHIESON

The Mathiesons came from the north of Scotland and farmed first at Marangi, south of Wanganui at the time of the Maori Wars. In the 1880's the menfolk rode through to Waverley, being followed later in a wagon by the womenfolk. They moved to "Woodleigh", and when James Snr retired, the farm was taken over by John who moved into town in 1910 where he built the home Nesta Mathieson lives in now. John was very involved in golf, bowling and the church. His brothers, Jim and Arthur, both became bank managers.





MIDDLETON

Introduction supplied by Sandy Middleton Hugh Middleton was one of twins born in Aberdeenshire, and bought up in Fettercairn. In 1886 he left Scotland for health reasons, having been recommended either Natal or New Zealand. Choosing the latter, he arrived at Port Chalmers a week after the Tarawera Eruption. When he heard people talking about the eruption he must have wondered exactly what kind of a place he had come to!

Hugh had been given the address of David Peat in Wanganui, and the upshot of this meeting was that he went to work for David Peat's son-in-law Alex Alexander on a farm near Normanby in South Taranaki. After about two years he returned south to work for Henry Sarjeant (who left money in his will for the Sarjeant Art Gallery in Wanganui).

In 1896 Hugh moved to Waverley to start farming on his own account on land leased from Alex Alexander. From this beginning his interests extended to several farms around the district including "Woodleigh", which he acquired from John Mathieson in 1911, two years after his marriage to Elizabeth Brown of North Otago.

He made his home on "Rosemount" until late February 1922 when Mr Alexander wanted it back for his son Bill. He then moved across the road to "Midstrath" and from there to his final home "Woodleigh" in late February 1926.

His main farming interests lay in breeding Lincoln sheep (which he changed to Romney Marsh in the early twenties when strong wools declined in favour of fine ones), beef Shorthorn and Clydesdales at the A. & P. Shows at Hawera, Wanganui and Waverley. He also used, in his heyday, to send rams to ram fairs in Hastings and Masterton.

Interests outside farming affairs were Waverley School Committee (1916-1925), Hawera A. & P. Society (being its president in 1924) and the Wanganui A. & P. Society. He was also on the Patea Hospital Board in the late twenties through the thirties.



MORRISON

Joseph Morrison was born in Turakina, and his wife, Margaret Young, was born in Ballymena, Ireland. The Young's luck held when the ship they tried to book on sank. A later ship bought the family safely to New Zealand, where they settled to farming at Oaonui.

Joseph bought a 100 acre block of land to clear in Oaonui, and until it was a viable asset, in production, came down seasonally to the Waverley area to shear with his brother John.

The property was sold when the family grew bigger and Joseph realised that he would need a bigger property to support his family. The family moved to Waihi, Hawera, and then on to Waverley where in about 1912 Joseph bought land off Luptons up Okutuku Road.

After WWI Joseph divided his land into three; Alex, Joseph and Herbert having a share each. William moved to his farm at Kohi, and lames farmed opposite the home farm and the youngest, Bruce, continued to live with his parents on the five acre block on Okutuku Road where Fred Potts now lives.

Later when Bruce went to Wanganui to work, his parents retired to Wanganui as well.

MULDROCK

Hugh Muldrock (Hughie) was born in 1884 at Ngutuwera, his father having arrived in 1874, the first settler in Block 9.

Hugh was sent to school when he was five, but after having negotiated the long distance to Kennedy's Woolshed where school was being held, was sent home again on account of the school being overcrowded at its opening. He was accepted later on in the year.

In 1907 Hugh married Miss C.E.M. Baggarley of Carterton and in 1919 he purchased the home farm. He had, prior to this, been working for his father as well as on his own sections further along the road.

Hugh was elected to the School Committee in 1917 and remained active until 1948; an impressive record. He was also chairman in 1920 and secretary in 1921-22 and 1923.

NEWLAND

Notes and genealogy by Jannet Newland

During hostilities with the Maoris, the Newland women and children were sent to Nelson for safety reasons. According to letters sent and received, this enraged George Samuel Newland, the younger son who was continuing his interrupted education at New Plymouth as a day boy, at Nelson Boys' College. He took advantage of an unsupervised situation and hurried back to New Plymouth where he was permitted to join his brothers in the Constabulary with the rank of private. The Newland brothers served with the Prussian mercenary Von Tempsky and in private letters described him as being 'quite, quite mad' and 'not fit to be in charge of men'.

The Newlands were given 'Marinoto' on the main north road as a land grant. This land now belongs to Brian Train. Also they received a section at Kakaramea. While farming at Marinoto they leased the neighbouring farm, Raithby, from Henry Northcroft of Opepoe, Taupo County and John Carrington of Wairoa broke it in.

William and Henry decided to return to New Plymouth and Marinoto was sold. George Samuel leased 128 acres — Te Hapua — Karahaki Road, directly from the maori owners and milked 30-40 cows in an open pen. He took his milk by sledge to the Whenuakura River and transported it across by flying fox and then again by sledge to the creamery situated on the left going north over the present Whenuakura Bridge. Later milk was conveyed by dray to the creamery at Kohi and Karahaki crossroads.

George married Agnes Beard of Kauangaroa, Fordell. The children of the marriage were all born at Te Hapua and educated in Waverley, but George was dissatisfied with the education his younger daughter Gladys received and withdrew here and sent her to the New Plymouth Convent, despite not being of this faith.

James George Newland and John George farmed in partnership before WWI. While James went overseas, John continued to farm.

(The entire length of Karahaki Road was once owned by the Wybourne family. "Bankhead" had been sold to the Walker family, who in turn sold to Cliff Dickie.)

When John married Maud Gwynne of Turakina the Newland brothers built a house at the Braemore crossroads. The land was cleared and grass seed planted at a cost of 25/- an acre. This house was razed to the ground while being used by a roadman at the time. By then Bankhead had been purchased from Cliff Dickie. The Newland brothers leased "Raithby" from Fred Wilson after he retired to Wanganui and before James Wilson returned from Hicks Bay to work the farm until his retirement. When the partnership dissolved in the early 30's John retained "Bankhead" and the Braemore Road property. James retained "Te Hapua" and "Raithby".

In 1935 James purchased 130 acres from Lad Wybourne and in 1942 "Marram" from Hugh Boyer. Later David leased "Putahi" from Mr Powderall then freeholded it.

It is interesting to note that the only two farms never to have changed hands in Waverley since originally purchased are "Te Hapua" owned by H.C. Newland, and the "Hone Estate" where Ada Hone lives.

PALMER

William Palmer first arrived in New Zealand while in the Royal Navy and fought in the Maori Wars, later returning in 1865 once again soldiering and supplying troops with supplies before he settled in Waverley, farming and butchering.

He farmed on the property known as Mount Pleasant at Moturoa.

Mrs Palmer was one of the independent breed of women who refused to leave her home during the fighting around Waverley. She is also remembered for her kindness to soldiers and travellers alike.

PEAT

The beginnings of the Peat family in New Zealand is an interesting one. David sailed from Kincardinshire in Scotland in 1858, arriving at Wellington and walking up from Wellington to Wanganui. A man of drive and resource, he took up farming in the Wanganui area, serving on the Wanganui County Council and the Hospital Board as chairman. It was he who was responsible for acquiring the land that the hospital is now on — not a popular move at the time, as it was considered to be out in the country! He also gave Peat Park to the primary children of Wanganui.

He had a large family, and two of these deserve a special mention. They are his daughters who both attended Wanganui Collegiate! Jane Peat (Mrs J.R. Stewart) and Maria Peat (Mrs Alexander Alexander) are shown in the school register as being No 109, 187718 and No 214 1978. Unfortunately the reason for these girls entering this generally accepted traditionally male domain is not recorded. Perhaps there were others as well!

Of the others, only two settled in Waverley. They were James Peat and his sister, Jane Stewart. Peat Road in Waverley is named after James.

James Peat originally owned Belmont, where the Walkinton family (N. & M.) now live. Peat came from good Scottish stock. Born in 1840 he was 20 before he found his way to Auckland. From there he went to the Otago goldfields. Peat also served in the Maori Wars in the Transport Corps, and after the war went into a farming partnership with his brother David and a Mr Alexander of Wanganui, before settling at 'Belmont'.

In 1871 he married Mary Jane Hughes and produced three children. The eldest Catharine married Augustus Walkinton, and it is grandchildren of this union currently living at 'Belmont'.

Peat was active in the Whenuakura Road Board and was a member of the first road board on the West Coast of the North Island.

PEPPER

Henry (Harry) Pepper came from Yorkshire, England and his wife was from the She Islands. Harry owned a little land out towards the beach and was a farm manager for Jackson's property, 'Rosemount'. An interesting story I was told about Harry was he was responsible for the Jacksons acquiring a racehorse! Apparently the Jacksons owned at Waitotara, and they used to sometimes take their horses down on the train. Harry ped his horse with another drover's because it was smaller. (Probably cheaper rates smaller horse.) David Jackson thought it might be good to race, and named it Rosem It won the Rangitikei Hunt Club Cup, 1923.

Francis Symes and his wife (nee Thorley) moved to Waverley about 1868 living in the commissariat office within the redoubt until their house was built near the racecourse. Some of his nine sons would have been born before his arrival, but as official records in Waverley start in 1880, I have not been able to find out if any of the children were born here or not.

The family spread to the East Coast and Wellington. Today the descendants of Francis are found in Waverley through Edmund Francis and his son Alfred Francis. Edgar's family lived here for some time as well before moving away. Oscar lived here until 1917 but had no family.

Francis was certainly a man of the land, living at Westholm with a keen interest in racing. His photo is in the Waverley Racing Club's rooms at the racecourse in Waverley. Many of the family were active in the Patea County Council.

WALKINTON

John Butters emigrated to New Zealand in 1867, setting up home in Kaikoura first then at Kohi, Waverley. They bought land at the first land sales in 1875. John joined the army to fight in the Maori Wars and became a lieutenant in the Wairoa Light Horse Volunteers on 20 November 1875 and the following year on 23 August he was promoted to captain and subsequently to a major in November 1886.

All his four children were born at Kaikoura; the youngest drowned in Australia in 1881.

The farm at Kohi burnt down and the family moved to Belmont, the house built by Mr Peat in 1881. Mr Peat became a father-in-law of Augustus John when he married Peat's daughter Catharine. These two lived at Belmont and in turn their son, John Butters, farmed at Belmont with his wife until he died in 1969. Now his children, Donald and Norman, run the property.

John Wall married Hannah Young on 4 May 1867 in Christchurch, Parish of Westbromwich, Staffordshire, England. They came to New Zealand on the ship 'Jessie Readman' on 7th September 1872. They had one child at the time. John James Wall aged 3 years. John Wall at that time was 30 years old, and his wife was 32.

John Wall later married again but it is with only his first family that we are concerned with at the moment.

He first came to Wanganui turning his hand to farming, probably on his father's farm. His father had previously emigrated. John worked on the construction of the Aramoho Railway Bridge having had previous experience as an engineer in some steel mills in England. Because of this he was able to effect a modification to an engine used on the job which had been performing poorly. Mr W.G. Bassett who was the contractor was very impressed.

Later he came to Waverley and farmed at Moturoa (now Omahina).

The Wilson brothers were part of a large family from Louth, Lincolnshire, which settled all over the world.

WYBOURNE

The Wybourne family originally came from England and settled at Fordell. It is believed that Manley Horton was probably born in Wanganui. He married Rachael Beard who was born in the goldfields of Australia and whose family also moved to Fordell.

It is believed that Manley Wybourne moved to Waverley after his marriage. His sister had married William Wilson, and as they were living in the area it is likely that the Wybournes moved up to them when the land opened up.

The Wybournes bought "Brookvale" on the Rangikura Road, parts of the land are now owned by Marie Wybourne, Thurlows and Duncan Robertson. All Manley's sons farmed about Waverley — Val taking over "Brookvale" after his father's death. On his death it was sold to the present owners.


